HISTORY



Dr. Robert Peterson Founder, Academic Decathlon®

Celebrating more than 50 Years of Academic Decathlon!

"In 1968, the first academic decathlon was held in Orange County, California. Since 1968, the Academic Decathlon has grown into the premier scholastic competition in the United States."

"There ought to be more rallies and academic activities for all students," were notes handwritten in pencil, found in the late Dr. Robert Peterson's belongings. Peterson was a B-17 pilot in World War II who was shot down over Italy and became a German POW in Stalag Luft I for 18 months. History tells us the concept for the Academic Decathlon® was created in a German POW camp. By the 21st century, it has become the premier academic competition in the nation.

Peterson's campaign in the late 1960s centered around an idea called an academic decathlon. It would include high school students, regardless of their grade-point averages. The aim was to get the average student to participate and work up to their potential. By 1968, his small pocket journals written in pencil in a POW camp were transformed into an academic decathlon competition.

In 1968, the first academic decathlon was held in Orange County, California. In 1979, the California Academic Decathlon was established, and by 1981, the United States Academic Decathlon was established as a national organization. In April 1982, the first USAD was held with 18 states participating.

The Academic Decathlon is designed to provide a forum for celebrating and acknowledging scholastic achievement and academic excellence in the context of a team environment. The competition provides high school students the opportunity to participate in an educational forum that fosters a deep respect for knowledge, cooperation and self-esteem.

Since 1968, the Academic Decathlon has grown into the premier scholastic competition in the United States. To this day, the Academic Decathlon brings students from the United States and beyond together to compete in a contest of academic strength.

Dr. Robert Peterson was a great friend and "father" of the Academic Decathlon and we are privileged to have been recipients of the wisdom and foresight of this most worthy educator. His innovative leadership and creativity enabled him to promote positive educational experiences for youth, initially in Orange County, California, but ultimately throughout the entire United States.

Dr. Robert Peterson exemplified all that is right about the American educational system and was a strong advocate for all young people. As founder of the Academic Decathlon, he enabled thousands of high school students to reach high levels of academic achievement through competition. Dr. Peterson has been truly missed. However, his leadership and educational contributions shall live on forever through the many bright minds that have been turned even brighter because of his initiative.

ABOUT ACADEMIC DECATHLON



UNITED STATES ACADEMIC DECATHLON

Founded in 1968 by Robert Peterson, Ed.D., former Orange County superintendent of schools, USAD serves as the model for all prestigious Academic Decathlon events that now exist at the state, national and international levels. USAD invites public and private high school students to compete as team members in a series of academic tests and demonstrations.

USAD, like its ancient Greek counterpart, is a 10-event contest. Unlike the Greek decathlon, however, USAD is an academic rather than an athletic competition and a team competition, as well as one for individuals. Participants demonstrate their academic strength by completing seven written tests (art, economics, literature, mathematics, music, science and social science) writing an essay, delivering prepared and impromptu speeches, and participating in an interview. The exciting Super Quiz is a team event held before a live audience.

The purpose of Academic Decathlon is to develop and provide academic programming, curriculum and assessment to promote learning and academic excellence. Students of all achievement levels participate in a variety of rigorous and challenging academic events while building teamwork and a competitive spirit.



HOW DOES ACADEMIC DECATHLON WORK?

Academic Decathlon teams consist of nine student members, known as decathletes. Each team consists of three honor decathletes (GPA 3.80-4.00), three scholastic decathletes (GPA 3.20-3.799) and three varsity decathletes (GPA 0.00-3.199). Each Academic Decathlon team spends months working together in preparation for an arduous and demanding competition season against other local area schools.


All decathletes compete in multiple-choice tests in the subject areas of art, economics, literature, mathematics, music, science, and social science. Each area, with the exception of mathematics, is based on an annual theme.

In addition, each decathlete writes an essay on a given prompt within a 50-minute period, delivers a planned 4-minute speech on a topic of their choice and a 2-minute impromptu speech, and participates in a 7-minute interview.

The competition culminates with an exciting Super Quiz, a team event where the community can cheer from the sidelines, much like a sporting event.

After scores for all objective tests, interview, speech and essay are cumulated, individual and team awards are presented at an awards ceremony.



The Super Quiz will use an automated response system (clicker). This system will display the questions on a large screen for the audience as they are read aloud for the decathletes. The correct answer will be displayed after each question with a graph showing the participant responses. Teams will wave a flag if they collectively answered the question correctly.

Students will come to the testing area as a group according to their GPA category. A total of 18 multiple-choice questions will be given for each relay round with five possible answer choices. Students will have 10 seconds to respond to each question with the exception of the mathematics questions (two per round) where students will have 20 seconds to respond.

Once the last answer choice has been read, team members can verbally communicate with each other (only non-verbal communication is allowed before the 10 second timer begins).


During the Super Quiz, students are expected to record one answer per team by pressing the appropriate button on the team assigned clicker. The clicker system will be used to calculate the team scores for all rounds of the Super Quiz only. One clicker per team will be issued.

All varsity students will be tested with the first 18 questions, followed by the scholastic students answering the next 18, and then the final 18 questions of the competition will be for the honors students.

Questions and subjects are randomized. Questions are worth one point each for a total of 18 points, per team, per round. The Super Quiz team awards will be presented at the conclusion of the Super Quiz event on Friday. The perfect score per series would be 18 points x 3 rounds = 54 points

The Super Quiz is a standalone event and scores will NOT be added to individual or team scores.



Individual Event Awards

Gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded in each division to the first, second and third place students from the honor, scholastic and varsity categories in each event. All ties will be awarded.

Individual Overall Awards

Gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded to team participants in each Division to the first, second and third place students from the honor, scholastic and varsity categories with the highest cumulative scores from all 10 events. Scholarships shall be awarded to the overall individual winners.

The Highest Scoring Student Award

This award is presented to the highest scoring student on each U.S. team in each Division.

Most Valuable Team Member

A medal will be presented to the decathlete who was chosen by their teammates as the most valuable team member by U.S. teams in each Division.

Team and School Awards

Team scores are determined by the two highest honor scores, the two highest scholastic scores and the two highest varsity scores for all 10 events.

Divisional Awards

Plaques will be awarded to the fourth place team in each Division. Championship trophies and banners will be presented to the first, second, and third place teams in each Division.

Super Quiz™ Team Awards

Plaques will be awarded to the first-place teams in each Division with the highest raw score for all nine students in the Super Quiz.

The Dr. Robert D. Peterson National Championship Award

This award will be given to the U.S. team from Division I, II or III with the highest overall score and shall be proclaimed the National Champion.

Special Awards:

B. Franklin Reinauer II Economics Prize

This award is presented to the highest scoring U.S. team participant in economics overall.

Asa Edwin Reaves, Esq. Social Science Prize

This award will be given to the highest scoring U.S. varsity team members in the area of social science.

Frank Wurtzel Prize

This award is presented to a varsity U.S. team participant who has the highest combined score in the areas of literature, essay, and speech.

State Directors' Communication Award

A \$250 award as a tribute to present and past State Directors who are no longer with us will be given to the team with the highest combined Nationals Essay, Interview and Speech scores. The award will rotate every three years based on varsity, scholastic and honor categories. All three individual scores will be used to determine the team scores for that category. Teams can use the funds at their own discretion.

Founder's Scholarship: Most Improved Varsity Student

This award is presented to a varsity U.S. team participant who has improved their score the most at nationals from their state competition score.

The Roberts/Caperton Inspiration Award

Two Robert/Caperton Inspiration Awards are given by the USAD Board of Directors to U.S. team participants who demonstrate a high degree of dedication, performance, strength of character, team leadership, perseverance and commitment while overcoming significant obstacles or unusual circumstances to participate in the USAD.

GENERAL RULES & GUIDELINES

The United States Academic Decathlon * Nationals is held under the auspices of the USAD Board of Directors. All testing, judging, scoring and any other function of the competition per se are managed by USAD. This year's event is being hosted by the United States Academic Decathlon in conjunction with a host of volunteers from the state of Iowa.

Decathletes and coaches are required to comply with the competition policies and guidelines. Failure to adhere to the policies and regulations could result in the disqualification of the participant and/or their team at the discretion of the USAD officials.

Eligibility Guidelines

The nine team members who participate on a Nationals team must be the same nine students who participated in the state competition. No substitutions are permitted. In case of an extreme medical emergency occurring after the state competition, USAD and the State Director will determine if another student may replace the absent team member. Teams shall NOT consist of more than nine members. Teams may compete with fewer than nine members, but must have a minimum of six members, two in each grade point average category. To be eligible for competition, teams must file all required documents in accordance with the deadlines set by USAD. Identification USAD ID badges must be worn to all competition events and must be plainly visible to the proctors and judges to verify each participant's identity. On each test booklet, you will find a "certification statement." You are to print your name and four-digit ID number on the designated line and then sign and date the statement for the test to be acceptable for scoring.

Testing Arena

Cell phones and other electronic devices are not permitted in the testing arena. Contestants will NOT be excused from the testing room (including Super Quiz) for any reason before the scheduled break. If a student leaves a testing room or event, they will NOT be permitted to return until the next scheduled break. Any participant who has a medical condition that requires special provisions of any kind must provide USAD with written documentation from a physician in advance of the competition. The decision to allow a medical exception is at the discretion of USAD and is final.

Tardiness

Participants are responsible for being in the proper location at the time each event begins. If a participant is tardy, they will NOT be allowed to enter the testing room or the speech and interview events. Contestants will NOT be allowed to enter the Super Quiz venue once the competition begins.

Starting/Stopping

If a proctor determines that a student has failed to stop when instructed or has started before being instructed to do so, the student will receive a score of zero for that particular test.

Test Materials

The proctor will supply all printed materials and writing utensils necessary for the subject area tests. Participants are NOT permitted to bring books, notes, purses, backpacks, coats, hats, mascots, electronic devices, smart watches, cell phones, or any other items (except for approved calculators), into the testing room. Any such items will be confiscated by the proctor and may result in the student receiving a zero for that particular event. The decision of USAD will be final and irrevocable.

Cheating

If a proctor or competition official finds a contestant involved in using or possessing a cell phone during testing; using any unauthorized means of communication; using any type of crib notes; or sharing, texting, storing or transporting test information (including inappropriate use of a calculator); the proctor must report the incident to the USAD testing director. If a participant is proven to have cheated, they will be disqualified from the event. However, depending on the severity of the infraction, the participant may be disqualified from the entire competition. Participants removed because of cheating or misconduct will NOT be eligible for any awards. Any person receiving or passing along any current year's tests or test items, except for USAD published practice tests, will disqualify themselves and their team from Decathlon participation. The decision of USAD will be final and irrevocable.

CONTINUED

Super Quiz™

This event is held before a large audience; therefore, spectators are asked to be as quiet as possible while the questions are being read to give each group of contestants an equal opportunity for hearing and responding. Participants are NOT permitted to bring books, notes, purses, backpacks, coats, hats, cell phones, electronic devices, or any other items to the team seating area or to the competition floor, except for one acceptable calculator for the mathematics questions. Any such items will be confiscated by proctors. Mascots must remain in the team seating area and are NOT allowed in the competition area. Coaches and state directors are NOT allowed to communicate with their team members during the Super Quiz. Any team that does not adhere to the Super Quiz rules may be disqualified from the event.

Withdrawal

In the case of an emergency or illness, a participant must formally withdraw in order to be eligible for any awards. To formally withdraw, a participant must give a written explanation of their withdrawal to a proctor or Decathlon official. An alternate student CANNOT be added to a team in the case of a withdrawal.

Test Scores

Any scores announced during the competition are unofficial. Test scores will NOT be posted at any time during the competition. The scoring center is off-limits to everyone except designated officials.

EXPLANATION OF SCORING

The United States Academic Decathlon has 10 events. Each event is evenly weighted at 1,000 points per competitor for a possible 10,000-point total per student. However, only six scores per team are counted for the team ranking (top two honor, scholastic and varsity) making the highest possible team score 60,000.

The social science, music, and literature tests have 50 questions each. The raw score for these tests is converted to 1,000 points with each question worth 20 points. The art, science, and economics tests have 55 questions with each question worth 18.18 points. The math test has 45 questions with each question being worth 22.2 points.

The essay is scored based on a rubric. Each essay is independently

read twice. If there is a divergence of 200 or more points in the two scores, the essay is read and scored by a third judge. The third score replaces the divergent score. The two scores are averaged for the final score.

The speech and interview are performed before a panel of judges (usually three). The judges complete the appropriate scoring forms online. The scoring program computes an average score based on a maximum of 1,000 points.

The Super Quiz™ will include questions from the subjects of art, economics, literature, mathematics, music, science and social science. In the Super Quiz three students from each GPA category will be asked to come to the stage. Varsity students will be tested with the first 18 questions, followed by the scholastic students answering the next 18 questions, and then the final 18 questions of the competition for the honor students. Questions are worth one point each for a total of 54 points per team. The Super Quiz is a standalone event, and scores will NOT be added to individual or team scores.

Gold, silver and bronze medals are awarded in each division, event and category (honor, scholastic and varsity). All ties are awarded.

Team overall ranking is determined by the six team members that make up the top two scores in each category (honor, scholastic and varsity).

All five divisions at Nationals will be score-based divisions and will be determined using each team's total state score (includes all 10 events). Teams from all divisions will be eligible for the Robert D. Peterson Award. An award list will be emailed to coaches following the awards ceremony that indicates the gold, silver and bronze medal winners in each event; special awards; top team in each division in the Super Quiz; and top 10 teams in the overall standings. Each coach and state director will be emailed the scores for their team.

Special awards are common in Academic Decathlon. At Nationals, they include the Asa Edwin Reaves, Esq. Social Science Prize; B. Franklin Reinauer II Economics Prize; the Frank Wurtzel Prize; the Roberts/Caperton Inspiration Award for overcoming challenges; the State Directors' Communication Award; the Rookie of the Year Award; the Founder's Scholarship: Most Improved Varsity Student; the highest scoring student from each team; and the Most Valuable Team Member Award from each team.

APPEALS PROCEDURE

An appeal regarding any test item (question and/or answer) can be made by any contestant through their head coach. Such an appeal must be emailed to USAD's testing director, Daniele Grigsby (daniele@usad.org), during the earliest break after a test has been completed. Appeals must be submitted within 30 minutes of the completion of the final test. Appeals can be made by head coaches only.

Appeals will be decided by an appeals committee consisting of the USAD board president, USAD state directors' president and president-elect, USAD testing director and the USAD executive director as ex-officio. If the appeals committee deems a question invalid, all students will be given credit for that question. Appeals identifying an invalid answer will result in the giving of credit to all correct answers. The decision of the appeals committee is final. Essay, interview, and speech scores are NOT subject to appeal.

2024-2025 UNITED STATES ACADEMIC DECATHLON CALCULATOR POLICY

USAD has always endeavored to reflect current high school curriculum and instruction in our competitions. Recent surveys of calculator use in high schools nationwide indicate that calculators are now used in the vast majority of high school mathematics courses across the country, and our decision to allow calculators is consistent with this practice in math instruction.

After reviewing the policies of the major testing institutions and consulting state directors, USAD has adapted MOST of the American College Testing (ACT) and College Board (SAT program) guidelines for calculator use as stated below.

I. Competitors May Use Calculators for the Mathematics Test

If competitors wish to use calculators on USAD mathematics test and or Super Quiz, they are responsible for bringing them to the test and/or Super Quiz. Calculators will not be provided for students who do not bring their own. Calculator use is permitted only for mathematics and Super Quiz mathematics questions; competitors will not be allowed to use calculators on any other test.

II. Permissible Calculators

If a competitor wishes to use a calculator, it can be a basic, fourfunction, scientific or graphing calculator, provided it has none of the features listed in Section III below. Calculator models with non-QWERTY keyboard are allowed. Calculators with alphanumeric keys (such as the TI-Nspire and TI-84 plus) are acceptable. During the mathematics test, competitors are not permitted to refer to information that was stored in their graphing calculator memory prior to the test. Students wishing to utilize their graphing calculator's memory function during the mathematics test will be required to have the memory erased prior to entering the testing room and at the completion of the mathematics test or Super Quiz.

III. Prohibited Calculators

Calculators with any of the following features are <u>NOT</u> allowed in the United States Academic Decathlon competitions:

- Pocket organizers
- Hand-held or laptop computers
- Electronic writing pads or pen-input devices
- Models with QWERTY keyboard-like keypad (e.g. TI-92 or HP-95)
- Models with paper tape
- Models that make noise
- Models that can engage in wireless communication (transfer data or information with other calculators)
- Models that require a power cord
- Models with CAS (computer algebra systems) (e.g. TI-89)

Because companies are continuously introducing new products, it would be impossible for USAD to maintain an up-to-date list of specific model numbers that possess these features.

If a competitor is uncertain whether a particular calculator will be allowed, the student should bring a backup that does not possess any of the features in question. No backup calculator will be provided for any competitor whose calculator is disallowed. Backup calculators that are approved by USAD may be taken into the testing arena, but can only be used if the primary approved calculator fails.

IV. Competing Without a Calculator

Competitors may opt to take the mathematics test without a calculator, however, USAD is suggesting competitors use a basic, scientific or graphing calculator for solving the mathematics test items.

V. Calculator Failure During a Test

If a competitor's calculator stops working during a test, the student should continue taking the test without a calculator.

CONTINUED

No additional calculator will be provided, and the competitor will not be allowed to take the test again later. However, as noted in Section III above, a competitor may bring a backup calculator and/or spare batteries to the test.

CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT

The United States Academic Decathlon expects all team members to conduct themselves with decorum while attending Academic Decathlon events. This includes travel, time on hotel premises, and any sightseeing associated with students' participation in the 2025 USAD Nationals, and all related events in Des Moines, Iowa.

Appropriate conduct of team members is the sole responsibility of the team coach who has legal responsibility as the chaperone for team members at all times. Students should be under the supervision of the coach during the entire competition. All students are expected to be in their rooms by 10 p.m. (unless participating in a scheduled event). If behavior in common areas of the hotel is disruptive, an earlier curfew may be imposed either by USAD or the hotel management. It is the responsibility of the team coach to be available and to enforce such a curfew and any other regulations determined necessary by USAD officials.

Inappropriate conduct includes, but is NOT limited to:

- 1. Cheating
- 2. Being in possession of any cell phone, electronic devices, study materials, etc., in the competition testing areas, including speech and interview and Super Quiz™
- 3. Being in possession of any weapon
- 4. Damage to, or vandalism of, any property including hotel rooms and competition sites, stealing
- 5. Use of alcohol or illegal drugs by students, regardless of age
- 6. Use of water pistols, water balloons or any other projectile at the hotel or competition site
- 7. Fighting, loud noise, or any other behavior that is disruptive to others at the hotel or competition site
- 8. Disrespect to the competition, competition officials, proctors or coaches

Financial liability for all damage incurred by actions of a team member shall be the sole responsibility of that team member and their parents. Failure to comply with the Student Code of Conduct may result in disqualification from the event, the entire competition and the awards ceremony. The decision of the USAD administration is final.

Teams should be aware that failure of any team member to adhere to these policies and procedures may result in disqualification of the delinquent student and/or the entire team. Furthermore, cheating in any form will not be tolerated. Any act of cheating will be promptly brought to the USAD officials for review, evaluation and imposition of possible sanctions. If someone is proven to have cheated, it is within USAD's power to disqualify not only the person caught cheating, but also the entire team.

Decathletes that violate the Student Code of Conduct run the risk of being eliminated from the national competition.

USAD NATIONAL DRESS CODE

As representatives of the United States Academic Decathlon, their respective states, and their high schools, coaches and decathletes are expected to maintain a positive and professional appearance during all Academic Decathlon-related events. Inappropriate attire may result in disqualification from competition or exclusion from awards ceremonies.

General Guidelines

The dress code aims to create a fair and distraction-free environment for all participants. Attire must be neat, clean, and conducive to focused competition. USAD Officials have been trained and have the authority to address violations. If a violation occurs, the decathlete will be given an opportunity to correct it. Failure to comply may result in missing a scheduled test or, in severe cases, disqualification. Decathletes with medical, religious, or accessibility needs requiring exceptions should notify their team coach in advance to request approval from the USAD Officials with their registration for the national competition. Students with exceptions will be provided with a designation on their name badge/lanyard for the competition. Test proctors will be trained to apply the policy consistently and objectively, addressing violations discreetly and providing opportunities for correction. Concise guidelines are listed below and will be provided to all participants ahead of the competition, with opportunities for questions and clarification.

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Objective Testing and Super Quiz™

Acceptable Attire:

For objective testing and Super Quiz, decathletes may wear casual attire or clothing that represents their school or team. Attire may incorporate the current Academic Decathlon theme but must not include any content that could provide an unfair advantage during testing (e.g. maps, art specific tthe year's curriculum, math formulas, etc.), such as maps with locations, math formulas, art related to the art curriculum, or information directly related to potential test questions. Attire should reflect positively on the individual, their school, and the Academic Decathlon program. Hoodies and sweatshirts are permitted, but the hood must remain down and turned inside out. Cardigans and windbreakers are also permitted, but coats are not allowed in the testing area.

Inappropriate Attire:

Unacceptable attire includes clothing that conceals the face or head (e.g. hats, sunglasses, etc.) with the exception of religious headwear (e.g. hajib, yarmulke, dastar, etc.). Garments with excessive rips or holes that expose undergarments, clothing with distracting graphics or messages, and any attire that may be considered offensive or vulgar are also deemed inappropriate.

Speech & Interview

For Speech and Interview events, decathletes are encouraged to dress in business professional or business casual attire. Attire should not include any reference to their team or school and should not include uniforms or costumes.

Appropriate attire may include, but is not limited to, a business suit (pants or skirt) with a dress shirt or blouse and necktie, a blazer, sport coat, or jacket with a dress shirt/blouse and pants/skirt, or a business dress.





TESTING ARENA AND SUPER QUIZ CLICKER USE







Do I need to log in to my clicker?

No, the clicker is registered to the team. The clicker is labeled with your team number.

The screen is blank how do I turn this on?

When you are ready to input an answer, push the letter choice of the answer you want. When you do this it turns the clicker on and sends your response. This occurs in microseconds and is considerably faster than "bubbling."

How do I know the computer registered my answer choice?

When you see a "dot dot checkmark" on the bottom of your screen it verifies that your response has been saved by the computer that registers your answers.

I want to change my answer. Do I have to wait?

No, the transmission of data occurs in microseconds. Every time you change your answer, the display on the screen will display your actions, but holds the image so you can see what you have done. The actual data sends occur.

I pressed an answer and it read "Not an Option Please Retry." What does that mean?

You pressed a button that is not one of the possible answer choices. Possible answer choices are A, B, C, D or E. In this case you will need to wait until that message leaves your screen before entering an answer. For the best results, press directly down on the button of the answer choice you want. If you lay your finger across the pad, it is possible to select more than one button.

I pressed my answer choice, but it read "Not Open." What does that mean?

The time to answer the question has ended or not begun. You can answer the question as soon as it appears on the screen and up to the end of the 10-second timer. Once the countdown timer closes, you will not be able to submit a response. With a paper answer sheet, you may have waited until the last moment to answer in case you changed your mind and therefore did not have to erase. With a clicker, you can change your answer immediately, BUT if you wait until the last moment, you do run a risk of not getting your answer in for scoring. A suggestion is to enter your first answer choice as soon as you think you know. You can always change your answer quickly, but if you wait until the last moment and push your answer when the timer runs out, you will NOT be able to submit an answer.

My answer disappeared from the screen before the question "closed". What happened?

The screen will stay on and display your last data entry for a few seconds then go to sleep. If you answered your question early enough, it will go to sleep before the question closes (time runs out). When you enter your answer choice, watch the screen of your clicker to see the "dot dot check." This is your verification that your answer was saved on the computer.


